Brkki Huhtamo (born Helsinki, 1958) received his M.A. from the University of Turku, Finland, in 1987. He lectures about the history of audiovisuality at the University of Industrial Arts, Helsinki, the Universities of Oulu and Turku, and elsewhere. Beside Finland Mr. Huhtamo has lectured in Canada, Australia, Sweden, Hungary, Germany and Japan.

Mr. Huhtamo has edited more than 10 books and written extensively about the cultural history of audiovisuality and interactive media. His writings have been published in Finnish, Swedish, English, French, German, Japanese, Hungarian, Serbo-Croatian, Russian and Polish. He produced the first book about virtual reality in the Finnish language ("The Handbook of the Virtual Voyager", Turku: Lähikuva, 1991). His essay "'It is interactive, but is it art?'" was featured in the Siggraph 93 Visual Proceedings.

Mr. Huhtamo was the host and script-writer for the TV program Keinomatkalla I-II ("On an Artificial Journey") about computer-based media culture produced by YLE, the Finnish Broadcasting Company in 1992. Mr. Huhtamo is currently both hosting, scriptwriting and directing a program on Japanese media culture, "The Empire of Monitors", produced by YLE and scheduled for January 1994.

Mr. Huhtamo was the chief curator of the MuuMediaFestival, Helsinki and Espoo, 1990-92. He has also curated three international exhibitions of interactive art (Otso Gallery, Espoo, Finland) and the exhibition of Woody and Steina Vasulka for the Museum of Contemporary Art, Helsinki (1992). He works as adviser on video and electronic arts for the Museum of Contemporary Art, Helsinki. He was member of the "Machine Culture: The Virtual Frontier" exhibition (Siggraph 93) committee. Currently he is involved in organizing the fifth International Symposium on Electronic Arts (ISEA 94), to be held in Helsinki, August 1994.
