I never had a thing for Elvis but I went with Jim Morrison for a while until I got my senses back and realised he just wasn't good enough. Then there was John F. Kennedy. I wanted to have him because Marilyn Monroe did. She fucked a lot of dead men before they were dead. That's pretty chic.

WHY DEAD MEN ARE BETTER

The only way dead men can get into your by room is if you bring them or somebody leaves them there. Once a friend of mine left Michel Foucault under my pillow so I invited George Bataille to join us. They didn't get along so well and I asked Michel to leave. He was very reasonable about it. "POWER," Michel said when he left, "IT'S EVERYWHERE".

Dead men are better because they don't ask you stupid questions or leave the toilet seat up. You don't have to listen to their

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problems or take their advice. They don't bore you at dinner parties or openings with the latest update on their next movie project or tell you how long it takes to make their girlfriend come. It's easy with dead men: you can just put them away, turn them off, cover them up or leave the room when you've had enough.

Dead men are dead serious and they make no bones about it. If you want to have fun find a party boy who's gay and go out all night with him. Andy was a party boy. He went to parties with Bianca Jagger. But now he's dead he's serious. I like him better now. I know him. He's dead serious now he's dead.

Oh yeah! Live boys can love dead men. It's not just a girl's thing. I know a boy who loves a dead man much better now than when he was alive but the boy looks a bit like Anthony Perkins and that's spooky.
